

ASC Curriculum and Assessment Annual Report 2013-2014:
Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee (ASCC) & ASC Graduate Curriculum Committee

For activities from July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014

A. Curricular and Assessment Initiatives

Distance Learning

- In recent years, there has been a proliferation of Distance Learning courses at the University, and the numbers will undoubtedly increase even more significantly in the years to come. Going forward, courses that are requesting Distance Learning format will be reviewed by both ASC Technology for technological assistance and quality control and by the appropriate ASCC panels for compliance with curricular guidelines (which is especially important for GE courses). A new technical review workflow and the use of a technical review checklist were first discussed on 9-6-13. Diane Dagefoerde (CIO, ASC Technology) and Mike Kaylor (Director-Instructional Facilities and Services, ASC Technology) visited ASCC on 9-20-13 to provide further explanations and answer questions. The technical review workflow and checklist were formally approved by ASCC on 9-20-13.

Requirements for Curricular Submissions

- On 10-18-13, ASCC was informed that, starting 1-1-14, requests for new courses (and at times also course changes) that can count toward the major of the submitting unit (as a required course or an elective) will need to also include the curriculum map of that program. The map will be updated with the new or revised course and show the program goal(s) and levels the course is designed to meet. This requirement will make the course approval process more meaningful for ASCC and it will also benefit the units since units will be able to visualize how the proposed course will fulfill which major goal(s) and to what extent.
- On 4-11-14, ASCC approved a set of criteria to approve courses for GE Data Analysis. The rubric was developed by the NMS Panel in consultation with the Department of Statistics. Going forward, courses requesting GE Data Analysis will need to request a concurrence from the Department of Statistics and cover specific content requirements.
- On 4-11-14, the ASCC unanimously voted to add a required element to the syllabus template for course submissions. Proposers will be asked to specify the format of instruction (e.g., lecture, recitation, laboratory) and the number of contact hours per week. This will encourage units to think about contact hours when developing a new course.

EM Credit in Majors and Minors

- On 10-18-13, ASCC unanimously approved the motion that the requirement that no more than half of the credits for majors and minors be transfer credit from another university also be extended to credit by examination (EM credit). The approved language is: "At least one half of the credit hours in the minor or major must be credit from completed OSU coursework."

University-Wide Minor Guidelines

- During Spring 2014, the ASCC was informed of the university-wide guidelines for minors developed and approved by the Council on Academic Affairs. The changes that will be most noteworthy for ASC are: upper limit of 18 credits for minors; 1000-level courses cannot be counted in a minor; hours

beyond 12 can now overlap with major or other minor; no more than 6 credits can overlap with GE; a student is permitted to count up to 6 total hours of transfer credit and/or credit by examination toward a minor; no more than 3 credit hours of course work graded Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory may count toward the minor; no more than 3 credit hours of x193 are allowed.

Assessment of General Education

- During Autumn 2013, the Assessment Panel finalized the 2013 Assessment Plan for General Education and presented it to the full ASCC.
- Report requirements were established for GE course set reports as well as GE departmental reports that will be requested over the next five years.
- The Panel reviewed the GE Education Abroad reports that were submitted from May Session 2013 and provided feedback to the instructors.
- The Panel reviewed the GE Service-Learning reports that were submitted from Autumn 2013 and provided feedback to the instructors.
- As part of the 2013 Assessment Plan for General Education, course set reports were requested. Meetings were held with the representatives for each course during Autumn 2013. The course set reports will be submitted by June 2014. Course Set S1 focuses on two GE categories: Visual and Performing Arts & Cultures and Ideas. The courses that were requested to submit reports were determined by enrollment trends by category.
- Based on the 2013 Assessment Plan for General Education, departmental reports were requested. Meetings were held with the units that will be submitting departmental reports (History, Center for Life Sciences Education, Spanish and Portuguese, and Psychology). Each departmental report will focus on one specific GE category and provide data from several courses across all levels (beginning, intermediate, advanced). In addition, each department will be asked to develop a scoring rubric for the GE category that they will be assessing.
- Working groups were established to develop GE category-specific rubrics for Visual and Performing Arts, Cultures and Ideas, Social Diversity in the US, and Global Studies. Meetings with the working groups were held in Spring 2014 with a request to have a draft of the rubric completed by the end of Summer 2014.
- As of January 2014 all new GE courses will be asked to submit a preliminary GE assessment report after the second offering of the course.

Freshman Seminars

- A separate report on Freshman Seminars will be submitted by the Freshman Seminars program.

B. Programs

Undergraduate Curricular Requests Approved by ASCC:

New Majors

Data Analytics BS

Data Analytics applies fundamental scientific principles to analyze large and complex data sets in order to answer questions, extract patterns, and predict behavior associated with those data sets. Data Analytics also uses such analysis to guide problem-solving and decision-making. Demand for workers

with data analytics skills is expected to increase tremendously in the next few years. The new Data Analytics BS was developed by the College of Arts and Sciences in collaboration with the College of Engineering, the College of Medicine, and the Fisher College of Business. It is jointly administered by the Department of Statistics and the Department of Computer Science and Engineering. The major is structured in three parts: data analytics core, discipline-specific specializations, and a capstone experience. Three specializations have been approved so far: Business, Computer Science and Engineering, and Biomedical Engineering. Additional specializations are expected to be created in the future. These will need to be approved through the curricular process. A minimum of 127 hours are required for the degree, with 51 credit hours in the core requirements and a minimum of 14 credit hours for the specializations. An initial enrollment of about 100 students is expected in the first year, with eventual growth to over 200 students per year.

International Studies BS

The new BS aims to combine the regional and thematic studies of international studies programs with a strong scientific background. The 30-hour BS is available in all 10 interdisciplinary majors that have for several years been available to BA students. The structure of the BS includes a 12-hour required foundation, 12 hours of critical perspectives, one language course above 1103, and one elective. BS students are also required to complete one of six approved minors (agribusiness, city and regional planning, environmental science, general business, geographic information science, or global public health). The new major prepares students for entry into law or business schools, master's or PhD programs and employment in government, the military, the private sector and various international organizations. An initial enrollment of 10 students is expected, with growth to about 40 students in year four.

Political Science BS

The new BS provides a rigorous program in social scientific methodology which equips students to study and produce empirical research about politics. The major prepares students for careers in law, business, political analysis, consulting, public policy, education, and journalism. The 33-hour major consists of four core courses in political methodology, one course from three of the four subfields in Political Science (American Politics, Comparative Politics, International Relations, and Political Theory), and at least four electives. Based on survey data gathered by the Department, enrollment is expected to be at least 200-300 students.

World Politics BA

The new BA provides an in-depth understanding of political institutions and processes around the world at the cross-national and international levels. The major is excellent preparation for work in international organizations and businesses, research institutes, and secondary and higher education. The 33-hour major contains four areas of specialization (Foreign Policy and Security, Political Institutions and Processes, Political Economy and Development, and International Theory). Students must take at least four courses in one area of specialization and at least one course in each of the other three. Based on survey data gathered by the Department, enrollment is expected to be at least 300-400 students.

Dual programs BA History/MA East Asian Studies and BA History of Art/MA East Asian Studies

Proposals were reviewed as informational items but did not need formal vote by ASCC.

Major Revisions

GE revisions to BSD programs

The changes are made in response to the National Association of Schools of Art and Design (NASAD) accreditation report from 2013 that requested that the BSD programs increase the number of Art and Design History credits to twelve. In order to achieve this, the following revisions to the GE have been approved:

- Add “History of Art 2001, Western Art 1: Ancient and Medieval Worlds” to the “Historical Study” category.
- Move “History of Art 2002” from the “Historical Study” category to the “Second Historical Study” category.
- Add “Choose one 3 credit hour course from History of Art 3000-level or above” to the “Open Option” GE category, which would effectively reduce the open credits to three, from the current total of six.

English BA

The main revisions to the English BA are

- Add a required diversity course - increasing the major by one course, from 12 to 13.
- Group the major into four concentrations: “Literature” (LIT), “Writing, Rhetoric, and Literacy” (WRL), “Creative Writing” (CW), and “Folklore” (FOLK), each anchored by a ‘Methods’ course (English 2298 = LIT & CW; English 2279 = WRL; English 2270 = FOLK).

History of Art BA

The main revisions to the History of Art BA are

- Add a senior research seminar (HA 4016), i.e., capstone course.
- Allow students to count up to two 2000- or 3000-level courses towards the major (instead of requiring majors to take three 2000-level courses).
- Restructure the distribution requirements to be more reflective of the current make-up of the faculty and of the courses that are actually taught.

Italian BA

The revisions to the Italian BA are

- Students must take It 2102, or a 3000-level course, and at least two courses at the 4000-level or above (taught in the Italian language on the OSU campus - i.e., not study abroad).
- Up to 3 credits of 2193 or 5193 and up to 6 credits of 2194 or 5194 may be counted toward the major provided that they are taught in the Italian language.
- Up to 3 credits of 4998 (or 4998H) or up to 9 credits of 4999 (or 4999H) may be counted toward the major.
- Students may count one course taught in the English language (2051, 2052, 2053, 2054, 2055, 5051, and any course at the 7000- and 8000-level) toward the major.

Microbiology BS

The revisions are intended to give students flexibility in their introductory Calculus prerequisite courses. Currently, students are required to take both Math 1151 and 1152. In the revised curriculum, students take either Math 1151 or Math 1156 for their first course. For the second course, students take one of the following: Math 1152, Math 1157, Stats 1450, or Stats 2480

Political Science BA

The revisions to the Political Science BA are

- Students take 24 credit hours of classes numbered 3000 or higher instead of 24 credit hours of classes numbered 4000 or higher. The previous requirement was based on an outdated set of expectations for majors. The new requirement will increase flexibility for majors to meet the program's requirements.
- Allow Political Science 4781 to count toward any of the four fields in Political Science (namely, American Politics, Comparative Politics, International Relations, and Political Theory).

Graduate Curricular Requests Approved by ASC Graduate Curriculum Committee:

New Graduate Programs

Cognitive and Brain Sciences GIS

The GIS in Cognitive and Brain Sciences aims to provide graduate students in Cognitive Science and Cognitive Neuroscience with interdisciplinary exposure beyond their home discipline. The GIS includes at least 11 credit hours: a required introductory course (either Introduction to Cognitive Science or Cognitive Neuroscience), the required Proseminar in Cognitive Science, and two elective courses. An initial enrollment of about 15-20 students per year is expected, with a total enrollment of about 100 students at any given time.

Graduate Program Revisions

Comparative Studies MA

The modification to the MA allows students to pursue a non-thesis option and provides an opportunity for students to complete a terminal MA with a publishable document.

Arts Administration, Education and Policy PhD—new specialization

The revision establishes a new Specialization in Art Education. The need for this distinct specialization has arisen due to the department and PhD name change from Art Education to Arts Administration, Education and Policy (AAEP). Students now have the option to specialize in one of the following three areas: Cultural Policy and Arts Management; Museum Education and Administration; or Art Education. Student specializing in Art Education need to take five required courses, choose four elective courses that pertain to art education, and register for dissertation research hours.

Italian Studies PhD (small changes)

Revisions were reviewed as informational items but did not need formal vote by the ASC Graduate Curriculum Committee.

C. Courses

From July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014, **526** undergraduate and graduate course requests were processed through the College of Arts and Sciences. Details for course requests with the most curricular import are given below (pp. 6-12). No details are provided for more routine requests (e.g., addition of a campus of offering, creation of cross-listing, change to prerequisites, corrections of typos).
